## Canine Influenza

Over the past several months, 72 cases of canine flu have been reported in California, according to Cornell University. The rapid spread of the contagious virus from dog to dog has caused the temporary closure of boarding facilities in the Bay Area. While there have been no cases of canine influenza in Calaveras or Amador counties, it is good to familiarize yourself with the symptoms.

The symptoms of canine influenza include a fever, coughing, runny nose, sneezing, lethargy, reduced appetite, and discharge from the eyes and can range from mild to severe, depending on the case. However, it can be difficult to determine whether the dog has influenza or an older virus like parainfluenza or Bordetella (kennel cough), because the clinical signs are nearly identical.

In speaking with Dr. Alison Pillsbury (Acorn Vet Clinic, Amador County) she recommends taking your dog's temperature if they seem "off" their normal behavior, or show any signs listed above. Like people, some have strong immune symptoms and others have weak immune symptoms so the course of treatment may vary from dog to dog. Dr. Pillsbury says "KNOW your dog" and what is normal and not normal for them.

As to the vaccine, some vets are recommending the 2-shot series now - the older H3N8 virus and the newer H3N2 virus. Others, like Dr. Pillsbury, are taking a "wait and see" stance because the current vaccines do not appear to be effective for the most prevalent strain of the flu virus. Like the vaccine for people, they take their best guess and
develop the vaccine but some years their guess is a bit off, such as the current human vaccine is only estimated to be $30 \%$ effective this year. Dr. Pillsbury is having her staff monitor the CDC and veterinary websites for updated information.

All dogs are susceptible to infection from the newer virus due to their lack of antibodies that can fight the disease. Canine influenza is classified as a "lifestyle disease," so dogs that are more isolated have a lower chance of infection, and dogs that visit public places and come in contact with other dogs more often have a higher risk.

The virus is contagious and is spread in similar ways to human influenza. The disease can be spread from dog to dog through respiratory secretions, sneezing, licking other dogs, and can even be spread on fomites (inanimate objects), including the clothing of a person who has come in contact with an infected dog.

When the disease is contracted, it is treated symptomatically: the treatments alleviate the symptoms. Antibiotics are only prescribed if the dog develops a secondary bacterial infection. Both strains have high morbidity rate, or the amount of dogs infected with the disease, but a low mortality, or death rate.

Treatment largely consists of supportive care. This helps the dog mount an immune response. In the milder form of the disease, this care may include medication to make your dog more comfortable and fluids to ensure that your dog remains wellhydrated. Broad spectrum antibiotics may be prescribed by your veterinarian if a secondary bacterial infection is suspected.

Happy Tails Helpful Training Tips

## Oh no! Not my shoes!

Have you ever come home to find that your pup has decided your shoes were his new chew toys? Well, you are not alone! Inappropriate chewing is one of the most common unwanted behaviors your pup may do. It is important to understand all dogs, especially puppies, are going to chew and it's your job to teach your pup what things are appropriate to chew on.

So how can you help teach your pup to stop chewing on your things?

1- First off remember, ALL dogs chew, but WHAT they chew is up to you! By fixating your pup on the proper chew toys, it will be easier for him to make the correct chewing choices.

2- You should have four to five proper chew toys and make sure all family members know that these are the toys the pup is allowed to chew on. Be careful to stay away from anything that resembles valuables in the home. For example, a rope toy may resemble the tassel ends of a rug.
3- Then play with these toys with your dog, using praise, petting, and play to encourage your pup to want to pick up and chew on the correct toy. These chew toys need to be the major source of interaction between
your pup and all family members.
Eventually your pup will learn to enjoy chewing on these toys and will be less likely to chew on your furniture or favorite pair of shoes!
4- Make sure not to draw your pup's attention to inappropriate items by chasing him when he has a hold of something he shouldn't. You don't want it to turn into a game of 'catch me if you can' because this is rewarding to your pup. Dogs love a good chase! So instead, try to lure him away from the item by offering a tasty treat or by providing him with the appropriate chew toy. This might take some time so be patient. Then make sure to put the item up and out of reach of the dog.

Stay focused on using the appropriate chew toy when playing with your pup and reward him whenever you see him doing so. He will soon learn that it is much more fun to chew on the proper chew toy then to have a chew on those shoes!
